## Vale Colin Cooper

I emailed Retired Telecommunications
Employees Association members on
Friday, 9th August 2024, of the sad news that
Colin Cooper passed away on Thursday,
Ist August 2024.

Members will remember Col as the State Secretary of our Union and the Federal President over several decades.

I also remember CoI as a 1958-year technician in training, the same year as I was. During CoI's period in office, I was a Branch State Councillor, State Vice President and Federal Councillor; as a result, I got to know him very well, and we became close friends.

During Col's period in office, many changes came to the workplace. The Union had to contend with the impact of new technologies and the new competitive environment for delivering telecommunication services. Management sought to downsize staff numbers affecting members' career opportunities and employment prospects. Through Col's leadership and the support of members, the Union's response was to face these challenges with the key objective of providing the best possible outcomes for members.

The 1970s were turbulent times when the Union fought for and won a shorter working week including a nine-day fortnight and significant wage increases.

More was to come in 1978, when the Union faced a significant dispute over the introduction of new exchange technology, in the first instance, AREII and AXE technologies. Telecom's objective was to reduce technical staff numbers significantly. The dispute's outcome achieved greater acceptance of the Union's position. As a result, there were two major industrial agreements (MEMO and CEMO for metropolitan and country exchange maintenance organisations, respectively). The industrial agreements detailed the principles for a staff organisation within an exchange district, offering a more progressive technical staff structure. These agreements were to last more than fifteen years. The late Bob Parkinson, Bruce Maclean, and our current members Bruce Coxall and Paul Rewhorn were heavily involved.

Shortly after I became a member of the NSW Branch Council, Col encouraged me to take on the roles of State Vice President and Federal Councillor. The Union was facing a range of management-initiated reorganisations. Col entrusted me with leading the national reorganisation of PABX maintenance and restructuring the City of Sydney operations district. Both organisations were about to face the threat of competition on a significant scale. I will never forget the confidence that Col showed in me.

Likewise, customer installation was undergoing a significant change. To the Union, management seemed content to retreat from the customer equipment market despite the ongoing appreciable profits and demand. Again, Vince Haywood and Jim Hall provided leadership by showing management that there were viable means of maintaining market share. Col and NSW Branch were always in full support.

It is appropriate to mention that the Union achieved these successes during a challenging period when Col was in office. I am proud of our Union because it has always canvassed its members' opinions on issues. Democracy was never out of the thoughts of our officials and other elected representatives.

Turning to current times. Col spent several years in an aged care facility in Avalon. Col is survived by his wife, Peggy and three children.

The family are holding a private ceremony for Colin. Peggy has informed me that she is organising a celebration of his life for all his friends to attend. This special event will be on the evening of Friday, 13th September 2024, at the Petersham RSL Club. Peggy cordially invites members of our Association to attend. More details will follow in the next newsletter. Since my email, many members have emailed their memories of Col; these messages are in this newsletter.

I am confident all members will join me in extending our heartfelt condolences and sympathy to Peggy, Colin's children and his many friends within the Union movement.

# Vale Colin Cooper 1941- 2024. By Peggy Trompf



Colin Cooper was born to working-class parents in 1941. Raised in the western suburbs, he went to local Yagoona public schools and became a mean basketballer, soccer and footy player. He did well at school, where he developed an interest in history.

Colin began work with the PMG as a Telegram Messenger ('telegram boy') in 1957, joined the PMG Training School in 1958 as a technician trainee and became a Senior Technician in 1965. During that time, he was an active union member of the Postal and Telecommunications Technicians Association (PTTA) and, in 1966, was elected as its NSW Assistant Branch Secretary. (In 1975, the PTTA became the Australian Telecommunication Employee Association (ATEA). With continuing amalgamation, the names were changed to the ATEA/ATPOA, CWU Telecommunication and Services Branch, and the CEPU (Communications Division - Telecommunications and Services Branches).

In 1973, Colin was elected as the NSW Branch Secretary of the union. He held that position until 1995 when he became the full-time National Divisional President of the Communications Division of the CEPU.

As NSW Branch Secretary and Federal President of the Union from early 1970, he was involved in all major industrial campaigns and negotiations. These included the establishment of Telecom and Australia Post, the shorter hours and nine-day fortnight agreement of 1975, the staffing and technology disputes arising from introducing new telecommunications technology and all wage negotiations. Other activities included campaigns against the establishment of other than government telecommunications carriers and against the privatisation of government enterprises. He led major campaigns against the privatisation of Telecom.

In 1973, he became a member of the NSW Board of the Trade Union Training Authority (TUTA) and was an active supporter of trade union training. Colin was an executive member of the Asian division of the International affiliate organisation the Post Telegraph and Telephone International (PTTI).

Colin served as the full-time senior union leader at the state and national level for 41 years. On his retirement in 2007, he completed an Honours degree in history and industrial relations at the University of Sydney.

I met Col at a union function in 1989. Our long and happy life together was interrupted by Colin's diagnosis of the degenerative brain disease, Frontotemporal dementia. He died peacefully in his sleep on 1 August 2024.

I hope Colin's friends, comrades, retired members and union members join me in a tribute to him, acknowledging his never-failing loyalty and service to workers.

## Bogandilla Telephone Exchange

A tour general meetings, members often express their frustration about the poor service they receive from their telecommunications service providers when they have a problem. They speak about imploring a consultant to do something to resolve their service complaint and the need for repeated calls.

The Telecommunications Industry Ombudsman (TIO) commissioned the Consumer Policy Research Centre (CPRC) to report to better understand who are experiencing challenges with telco services in Australia and what a complaint experience is like for them.

The CPRC's research findings were:

- 55% of Australians encountered at least one challenge with their telco services in the last twelve months
- 40% of people who did not make a complaint said they did not believe their complaint would make a difference.

Below is a copy of correspondence from a Bogandilla subscriber to the Roma District Inspector. The correspondence perhaps demonstrates that teleco service problems have been ongoing for at least 80 years, and we should not expect things to change much despite the efforts of the Telecommunications Ombudsman.

One of the subscriber's claims that the one problem with the Bogandilla switchboard is its age. He tells the District Inspector the Bogandilla switchboard has deterioated over its 2000-year history of

Further, the subscriber claims that his service problem is also due to the PMG spending too much time on fancy gadgets and trying to link phones worldwide with an automatic service.

Dear Sir,

I have been advised by the operators of same that they have resigned with a temporary grace, in which time a decision must be made regarding the service; I understand also, if it does not go to another subscriber, the phones will have to close.

Now if the latter is the case I am very disappointed with the Department's attitude, as the only logical thing to do, to save trouble, inconvenience, and expense is to shift the exchange to Dulacca or some other continuous service, and where it will have better access to the Main lines.

Surely after all the years, that exchange and its equipment has been going, and people have patiently put up with the service they have had, now when it has finally come to a show down and something really has to be done the Department could do the right thing by them and make a decent bloody job of it, once and for all. But as to creating some sort of cerimonial hoodee, about a Mouldy Moth-eaten, bloody old switchboard, that Christ probably used to ring up on, and has deteriorated to such a state that after ten points of rain, and nice dewy morning following, the bell refuses to work and it is necessary to drive seven miles, and tell the exchange you would like to ring them. And the thoughts of you, dragging it three or four miles round the country side, and having to run a string of lines after it over rough country would be the height of bloody stupidity.

And to make matters worse there are two local exchanges, only a short timeback it was three, all on one wire to Dulacca and Miles and the difficulty and hold up in getting a call through during busy hours, is completely beyond toleration.

When you consider the cost of trunk line calls to take half a day to get through, probably miss the person you want on the other end, and can't hear on the bloody line anyway, and when you stop to compare this with the services in the city and you hear of all the fancy gadgets the Department is mucking about with, talking about linking all the phones up Automatic, the world over, so as a number can be dialled in Burke and ring up a bloody Eskimo on the North Coast of Alaska. And out here in the country where a phone is really needed, we've got a bloody job to ring our local town, it doesn't make sense, does it?

I hope you will give this matter your full consideration.

### Day 3 - Tuesday, 12th November 2024

### Dorrigo & Bellingen

During the morning, we drive up into the hinterland of the Coffs Harbour coast. Then, we drive across to Dorrigo Rainforest Centre, explore the information centre, and stroll on one of the walks, including a skywalk.

After working up an appetite, we head back to Bellingen, visit the old butter factory, and listen to a talk about the factory's history, which dates back to 1906. We will enjoy lunch at the factory and then have some free time to explore Bellingen before returning to the motel. Day 4 - Wednesday, 13th November 2024

### **Coffs Harbour**

We will have a local day in Coffs Harbour, driving up (depending on road conditions) to the Sealy Park Lookout, 310 metres above Coffs Harbour. There, you will see spectacular views from the sky pier.

On our return, we will visit the Coffs Harbour Wildlife Sanctuary to learn about their work rescuing wildlife and enjoy the Dolphin show after a short drive to the Coffs Harbour jetty for lunch and a stroll around the harbour. We will take a walk along to the mutton bird lookout.

In the afternoon, we visit a piece of Holland in Coffs Harbour. Known as the clog barn, we explore this unique attraction that is not found anywhere else in Australia. Have the chance to explore the shop and see how they make clogs.



### Day 5 (Thursday, 14th November 2024)

### **Urunga and Bowraville**

This morning, we will take a drive down to Urunga. This town is the meeting point of the Kalang and Bellinger Rivers, where both empty into the Pacific Ocean. We take in these views while wandering along the elevated Urunga boardwalk.

Next, we visit today's sweet spot: the Urunga Honey place. We will see the world of the honeybee with the glass viewing area and have an opportunity to sample the local honey.

After lunch, we take a short drive up to the small town of Bowraville. We have the afternoon to explore the folk and military museums or the township before returning to the motel for our last night away.

### Day 6 (Friday, 15th November 2024)

Return travel to Sydney with a refreshment break at a service centre. Lunch at Nabiac at the hotel or one of the other cafes before arriving back in Sydney in the late afternoon, after a thoroughly enjoyable trip away.
