Welcome to your May 2025 Newsletter.

Members have attended our previous two general meetings in large numbers, perhaps because of their interest in the topics of our two guest speakers. We had Roger Bamber speak at our March meeting and, more recently, Professor Ed Davies in April.

Emeritus Professor Ed Davies is a longstanding advocate for public broadcasting. He gave an insightful address on the critical role of the Australian Broadcasting Corporation (ABC) in supporting democratic discourse and public knowledge.

Public broadcasters prioritise the public interest by delivering accurate and unbiased information, unlike commercial or state-controlled media, which are subject to the pressures of commercial profit or government influence. Professor Davies emphasised the importance of maintaining the ABC's independence, free from commercial and political pressures, to preserve its credibility and public trust.

He highlighted the significant challenges facing public broadcasters worldwide, including funding cuts, political interference, and the spread of misinformation. These pressures threaten the ability of trusted institutions like ABC to fulfil their mission.

Professor Davies noted that the ABC is critical to Australian society. It provides news, cultural programming, emergency alerts, and regional services. It serves not just urban centres but also remote and rural communities, often being the only reliable source of information in emergencies.

He stressed that the ABC's funding has been steadily reduced over the decades, impacting its ability to meet its charter obligations. Professor Davies discussed the impact of digital media giants like Amazon, Meta, and Netflix, which have changed how people access news and entertainment and are drawing audiences away from traditional broadcasters like ABC despite public broadcasting remaining a highly trusted source of news and information, representing exceptional taxpayer value at just 12 cents per person per day.

Towards the end of his presentation, Professor Davies acknowledged that ABC faces challenges in attracting younger audiences, adapting to digital platforms, and sustaining innovation. He urged continued public support for the ABC and warned that without appropriate funding and protection, Australia's democratic health could suffer. He encouraged members to actively support organisations like ABC Friends to ensure a strong, independent public broadcaster for future generations.

I thank Professor Davies for taking the time to address our General Meeting. Our Association has been a member

of *ABC Friends* for the past five years, and we encourage members to consider joining *ABC Friends*.

We want to continue having a regular guest speaker at our General Meetings who can speak on various subjects, particularly those relevant to seniors.

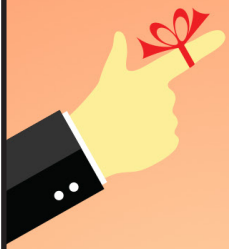

Home Batteries - It's,Time!

We've had solar panels on our roof for 15 years, waiting for the price of batteries to come down. We replaced the panels 12 months ago, but a battery was still not feasible.

All that has changed since the re-election of the Albanese Labor Government last Saturday (May 3, 2025). The promised "**Cheaper Home Batteries Program**" is now in play and on 6 May 2025, I signed a contract for a 20kW battery for an all-up cost of \$4,306.

This became possible because the \$370/kWh federal rebate can be 'stacked' with the NSW rebate of \$130/kWh to make a total rebate of \$500/kWh. A 20kW battery qualifies for a \$10,000 rebate!

A 20kW battery is twice the size we need based on our current usage however, there are other considerations. You only get one bite of the cherry for the federal rebate and it runs out in 5 years. We have recently gone all-electric, disconnecting our gas and purchasing a heat-pump hot water system and induction cooker. We also have ducted air conditioning, so I wanted to build in some redundancy. The payback time for our battery is estimated to be 4.7 years.

Oh, and there is one other consideration; "Australia is introducing a solar export tariff, often called the "sun tax", which will charge households for exporting excess solar energy to the grid.

Starting July 2025, solar customers in New South Wales will be required to pay 1.2 cents per kWh for energy exported to the grid between 10 AM and 3 PM. The goal is to reduce grid congestion and encourage homeowners to store excess energy in batteries or use it during peak times.

This policy has sparked debate, with critics arguing it penalises solar users who were encouraged to invest in renewable energy. Others believe it will help balance the grid and prevent energy wastage".

DETAILS OF THE CHEAPER HOME BATTERIES PROGRAM

"The Cheaper Home Batteries Program is a \$2.3 billion initiative by the Australian Federal Government, set to begin on July 1, 2025. It aims to reduce the upfront cost of home battery systems by approximately 30%, making solar battery storage more accessible for households and businesses across Australia.

KEY DETAILS:

- **Rebate Amount:** Around \$370 per kilowatt-hour (kWh) for eligible battery installations.
- **Eligibility:** Homeowners, small businesses, and community facilities installing batteries between April 6, 2025, and 2030.
- **Battery Size:** Systems ranging from 5kWh to 50kWh qualify.
- **Savings:** Households with existing solar could save up to \$1,100 annually, while those installing both solar panels and a battery could save up to \$2,300 per year. **Stackable Rebates:** The federal rebate can be combined with state-level incentives in NSW and Victoria for even greater savings.
- The program is designed to support the installation of over one million new batteries by 2030, helping Australia reach its 82% renewable energy target."
